County of Renfrew hosts Affordable Housing Summit

RENFREW – On Thursday, April 4, 2024, the County of Renfrew hosted a successful and informative Affordable Housing Summit; a full day which opened a dialogue towards the development of critical relationships to grow affordable housing across the Renfrew County region.

The goal of the Summit was to identify innovative partnership opportunities. It was a dynamic gathering aimed at creating a collaborative environment for developers, builders, investors, real estate specialists, elected officials and municipal staff to spark out-of-the box-thinking to address the housing crisis being felt across Ontario and beyond.

The conversation was sparked by Jason Davis, Director of Development and Property, who introduced the County of Renfrew's newly launched Expression of Interest, which makes County properties potentially available for developing affordable housing, including existing ageing stock within the Renfrew County Housing Corporation portfolio and other lands owned by the County of Renfrew.

"We are looking for willing partners and we want to develop plans to address the housing crisis that work for all parties involved. We are open to any and all innovative ideas," Mr. Davis said.

Overall, organizers were pleased about the multi-sector community engagement towards finding housing solutions and the feedback throughout the day, including the need for more seamless processes and less red tape.

Attendees heard from a range of speakers including Renfrew-Nipissing-Pembroke MPP John Yakabuski, who indicated the Provincial Government is working on a housing bill, and Renfrew County Warden Peter Emon, who shared details about the Eastern Ontario Wardens' Caucus '7 in 7+' regional housing plan that aims build at least 7,000 community rental units over seven years across eastern Ontario and relieve the pressure of the affordable housing waitlist.

"As Warden, I am heartened by the success of our housing summit, where community members have come together to discuss this important topic," Warden Emon said. "Let us harness the power of collaboration, innovation, and shared purpose to build a brighter future for all members of our communities."

Andrea Patrick, Director of Community Services, provided an overview of the programs offered through her department including Community Housing, Childcare & Early Years, and Ontario Works. She noted the wait for a housing unit ranges between seven and ten years with approximately 1,500 names on the local waiting list, while mentioning that figure is likely low as the wait time is a deterrent for many.

The Community Services Department offers financial assistance for housing through a number of programs: Affordable Home Ownership, Ontario Renovates and the Emergency Minor Home Repair Assistance Program.

Chief Administrative Officer Craig Kelley highlighted the newly minted Mesa initiative, which aims to address the root causes of homelessness, substance abuse and addictions and mental health while fostering a resilient and healthier community for all residents of the County of Renfrew. The Community Services Department along with the County of Renfrew Paramedic Service and Development and Property Department are working together on the program, a collaborative approach to compassionate care in the community.

In addressing the housing crisis, Mr. Kelley stressed the need for willing partners; "In times of crisis this community has stepped forward, and this is the time to do it again to meet the growing need and demand for attainable and affordable housing," he said. "All options are on the table."

Attendees also heard speakers from Cahdco, an organization which develops affordable housing solutions, and Habitat for Humanity, which brings communities together to help families build strength, stability and independence through affordable homeownership. Attendees received information about potential funding from the Federation of Canadian Municipalities' Green Municipal Fund, and the need for shovel-ready projects when applying for funding from the Canadian Housing and Mortgage Corporation.

Submissions for the aforementioned Expression of Interest are due by June 7, 2024 and the County is looking forward to seeing the proposals that come forward to address the housing crisis. The Expression of Interest can be found on the County's website at https://bit.ly/AffordableHousingEOI. A report on the Summit will follow the results of a postevent survey and be presented along with the results of the RFEOI, later this spring.

On Council's Agreement in Principle to Allow a Chip Truck at Killaloe Pathways Park

There has been misinformation and misunderstanding about my reaction to the proposed placement of a Chip Truck at Killaloe Pathways Park. With the publishing of an article in yesterday's Leader, I feel doubly committed to setting the record straight.

When Bil chatted very casually with me by phone before the Council meeting I remained open to the experiment of a Chip Truck, envisioning it as small, unobtrusive and, if approved, placed in the park away from the Highway 60 entrance so as not to compromise the five large red welcoming chairs and the park aesthetic (non-commercialization).

I also presumed that due process would be followed in terms of consultation as Council agreed to when it approved both the Pathways Park Master Plan in January 2024 as well as the Kllaloe BIA Operational Plan. Since this was a business venture, and the Park would be seen as a high value commercial location I assumed due diligence would be done before opening that space. (Three weeks ago I had been approached by another local food vendor who expressed interest in a pop-up food service at the park. I advised that person that the Park Committee would require a business plan and other details, and that once reviewed by the BIA it would come before Council for consideration.)

In the days following the Council meeting I was phoned multiple times by a woman who said she was representing Mr. Anwar; that the deal was approved in principle already; that they would pay attention to trash; that they would want to advertise the truck through the use of blowing men like you see on used car lots and lots of signage particularly at both entrances - and most importantly, it was not a small chip wagon as I had envisioned, but a 28 foot used chip truck, which she assured would be wrapped in a bright colour to maximize visibility. She said neither she or Mr. Anwar were aware of Council's Master Plan for the park. I did alert Bil to these details, which he said were not part of the information presented to Council, on which they enthusiastically offered approval in principle.

His subsequent conversations with Tammy and with Mr. Anwar led to this morning's meeting and to the idea that, perhaps, some of my concerns could be addressed though the development of the Memorandum of Understanding with Mr. Anwar. The Leader article reinforced the reality that Council had indeed already agreed to support Mr. Anwar's request.

Here are my three major concerns. I understand the Killaloe BIA has concerns as well and they will be writing to you separately.

- 1) KHR obtained close to \$250,000 in grants to support the initial development of the park as a place that fosters the intrinsic and reciprocal relationship between people and the natural world. We promised minimal to no commercialization in the park, and a strong focus on developing a calming and serene gathering place. CRC obtained funding for greenhouses based on its commitment to food security and to growing healthy food to be provided at no cost to those who need it. I believed those commitments. I cannot see any real connection between these values and the unhealthy food and high sugar drinks offered by a for-profit food truck. It sends a very mixed message.
- 2) The KPP Master plan, approved by Council put a process of consultation into place, and a series of principles against which any new addition to the park, and most especially a commercial operation, would be assessed. Council failed to respect its own process when it offered approval in principle to Mr. Anwar's request. No official consultation based on a detailed description of the planned installation occurred. Mr. Anwar was

- offered a highly valuable location that other businesses would have been equally interested in competing for through a fair and equitable process.
- 3) The sustainability of Killaloe Pathways Park long term rests on close partnership and cooperation with all the Village's businesses. Funding for the maintenance of all three trails is directly linked to long mutually beneficial relationships. To that end we are in the process of putting a large map in the park, designed by a local artist. The Killaloe BIA and the Friends of Killaloe Pathways Park were intending on launching this process with the official spring opening of the park. From its earliest planning stages the Park was designed in part to increase local traffic into downtown Killaloe. A chip truck may very likely do the opposite by offering travellers on Highway 60 a quick port-a-potty and snack pit stop before they travel on their way towards Barry's Bay or Eganville. This is the exact opposite of the Park's intent, as approved by Council.

To sum up, I am as keen as anyone else about economic development in KHR, and I'm very grateful for local business people, like Mr. Anwar and other members of the Killaloe BIA, who wish to boost our wellbeing through well-considered, evidence-based business decisions.

The approval in principle by KHR Council appears, in my opinion to have bypassed processes supporting the development of Killaloe Pathways Park that it just recently endorsed.

The following resolution, adopted by City Council at their meeting on April 8, 2024, is forwarded for your information and necessary action.

That Council approve the recommendations outlined in Report LSOCS24-005, dated April 2, 2024 of the Commissioner, Legislative Services, as follows:

- a) That the Honourable Paul Calandra, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing, be requested to introduce a Bill to amend the Ombudsman Act to require the Ontario Ombudsman to provide to each municipality, if requested by the municipality, sufficient particulars of each investigation, matter or case respecting the municipality that is referred to in each of the Ombudsman's Annual Reports to permit the municipality to fully understand and address the subject matter of each such investigation, matter or case including:
 - i) a copy of each complaint, as applicable, redacted only to the extent of individuals' personal information contained therein;
 - ii) the identities of the municipality's employees, officers and members of Council with whom the Ombudsman was consulting in respect of the investigation, matter or case; and
 - iii) particulars of the outcome of the investigation, matter or case including the Ombudsman's findings, conclusions and recommendations, if any.
- b) That the City Clerk forward Council's resolutions resulting from Council's approval of these recommendations to Minister Calandra, MPP David Smith, the Association of Municipalities of Ontario and to the municipal Clerks of Ontario's municipalities.
